

Decades of research show that afterschool programs help kids learn, grow, and avoid risky behaviors. Programs spark interest in learning so students attend school more often, get better grades, and improve their behavior in class. Through new learning experiences, young people discover what they love to do and gain the skills they need to land that first job.

Kids ages 6 to 18 spend 20% of their waking hours in school. How they spend the other 80% of their time outside of school also has a big impact on their success in school, their overall well-being, and their readiness for the future.

In a nationwide study of students who regularly attend $21^{\rm st}$ Century Community Learning Centers, teachers report that:

- > 65% improved their class participation and homework completion
- > 57% improved their classroom behavior
- > Nearly half improved their math and English grades

62% of Missouri parents agree that afterschool programs help children get excited about learning.

65% of Missouri parents agree that afterschool programs help children gain STEM-related interests and skills.

A 2017 evaluation of Missouri's 21st CCLC programs by the David P. Weikart Center for Youth Program Quality and the University of Missouri found that nearly all sites during the 2016-17 school year reported a majority of their students maintained or increased their academic achievement in reading (93%) and math (94%). Additionally, the evaluation found that students agreed that program staff helped with their homework and that their program taught them things that helped them in school, challenged them in a good way, and made them feel like they belonged and mattered in the program.

Missouri Needs More Afterschool

For every Missouri student in afterschool, 2 more would participate if a program were available.

21st Century Community Learning Center grants are the only dedicated source of support for local communities' afterschool and summer programs. Demand for programs is so great that 1 out of every 2 applications cannot be funded.

Across America, 1 in 5 kids are alone and unsupervised from 3 to 6 p.m. These are the hours when juvenile crime and victimization peak—and many parents are still at work. When kids have no place to go after school, they miss out on valuable learning opportunities, parents lose 8 days of work and businesses lose up to \$300 billion a year.

Afterschool is changing that.

Afterschool programs give parents peace of mind because they know their kids are safe—online and offline—and engaged in fun learning opportunities.

For many parents, afterschool is a lifeline that helps them work without worry and balance their schedule.

- 7 in 10 Missouri parents say afterschool programs give them peace of mind and help them keep their jobs.
- 7 in 10 Missouri parents believe afterschool reduces the likelihood that kids will engage in risky behaviors.
- 82% of Missouri parents support public funding for afterschool programs.

Afterschool provides a solid return on investment. Research shows that every \$1 invested in afterschool programs saves at least \$3 by:



- Increasing kids' learning potential
- Improving kids' performance at school
- Reducing crime and juvenile delinquency

21st Century Community Learning Centers

In Missouri, 21st Century Community Learning Center grants support local afterschool and summer programs serving 21,291 children in 144 communities. The grants are the only dedicated federal source of afterschool support.

Communities that earn Community Learning Center grants work with local partners to meet community needs. A typical partner contributes an additional \$67,000 to support programs. Nationwide, partner contributions totaled more than \$1 billion from 2006 to 2010.

Nationally, children attend programs in:

- Public school districts: 9,446
- Community based organizations: 1,125
- Charter schools: 463
- Faith-based organizations: 160
